South Mountain Symposium August 17, 18, and 19, 2001

(From a press release of The North Carolina South Mountain Fund, 9225 Surrey Road, Charlotte, NC 28227.)

The greatest gathering of historians ever for The Battle of South Mountain Symposium. In September, 1862 during General Robert E. Lee's Maryland Campaign, the Federal forces were pressing the Confederates at three gaps in Maryland's South Mountain chain, Turner's, Fox's, and Crampton's. North Carolinians fought at Fox's and Crampton's heroically and fatally. The dead were never brought home.

In October, 2000, the State of Maryland made this their first state battlefield. In honor of the North Carolinians that fought and died there, citizens are placing a monument at Fox's Gap for those brave young soldiers. Private citizens throughout the state are helping raise funds for this monument. Many prominent speakers have donated their time for this symposium, August 17, 18, 19, 2001 in Boonsboro, MD, at the American Legion Hall.

Located at the western foot of South Mountain, Boonsboro, MD, served as General D. H. Hill's base of operations. The determination of the Confederates to hold these three gaps on the 14th, gave General Stonewall Jackson the

time needed to capture Harpers Ferry and General Lee time to consolidate his forces at Sharpsburg.

Allen, James - Rank and organization: Private, Company F, 16th New York Infantry. Place and date: At south Mountain, Md., 14 September 1862. Entered service at: Postdam, N. Y. born: 6 May 1843, Ireland. Date of issue: 11 September 1890. Citation: Single-handed and slightly wounded he accosted a squad of 14 Confederate soldiers bearing the colors of the 16th Georgia Infantry (C.S.A.). By an imaginary ruse he secured their surrender and kept them at bay when the regimental commander discovered him and rode away for assistance.

Death of Captain Glenn, 13th NC, Company I

(From the Summer 2000 issue of N. C. South Mountain News published by the Living History Association of Mecklenburg, Inc., Charlotte, North Carolina.)

From the North Carolina Troops, Chalmers Glenn resided in Rockingham County and was by occupation a lawyer prior to enlisting in Rockingham County at age 30. Elected 1st Lieutenant on April 30, 1861, to rank from May 3, 1861, and was elected Captain to rank from April 26, 1862. Present or accounted for until killed at South Mountain, Maryland, September 14, 1861. "A very gallant officer."

The Company, known as the Rockingham Ranger, was from Rockingham County and enlisted at Wentworth on May 3, 1861. The company received orders to march to Garysburg the same day and began the march on May 13. It arrived at Garysburg on May 17. There it was assigned to the regiment as Company I.

The 13th was under command of Lt. Col. Thomas Ruffin, Jr. of Alamance County. The 13th, 5th, 12th, 20th, and 23rd made up Brigadier General Samuel Garland's Brigade which served in General D H Hill's Division. General Hill's orders were to prevent any Yankee retreat along Pleasant Valley and to guard the mountain passes. In the early hours of September 14th, 1862, General Garland received word from General Hill to march to Turner's Gap. Upon reaching the Gap at about dawn, Hill deployed Garland's brigade a mile south to Fox's Gap. Upon reaching Fox's Gap General Garland found a small force of Virginia Cavalry under Colonel Rosser, left behind by General J. E. B. Stuart.

General Garland deployed his force across a 1300 yard front, quite unusual for a brigade of just over 1000 men, with Colonel Rosser and the 5th NC on the far right and the 13th on the far left. General Garland stayed

with the 13th, commanding his brigade. Lt. Col. Ruffin suggested to Garland that he might seek safer ground for himself as the battle was under way. General Garland state, "I may as well be here as yourself". At that moment, Lt. Col. Ruffin was struck in the thigh by a projectile, he turned to Garland to ask him to get someone to lead his troops, when Garland was mortally struck and killed.

Another young officer died that morning, from Rockingham County, NC. Chalmers Glenn and his faithful servant Mat had been reared together since childhood. Mat had shared in all the boyish pranks and frolics of his master, and in later life had been his constant attendant and faithful servant. On the morning of the battle, north of Boonsboro, Captain Glenn called Mat to him and said: "Mat, I shall be killed in this battle. See me buried, then go home and be to your mistress and my children all that you have ever been to me."

From behind a rock the faithful fellow watched all day the form of his beloved master, as the tide of battle ebbed and flowed over that eventful field. At last he missed him, and rushing forward, found the prediction too truly verified--life was already extinct. Assisted by two members of his company, a grave was dug with bayonets, and soon the cold, silent earth held all that was dearest in the life to Mat. Slowly and sadly he turned his face homeward and delivered all the messages and valuables with which his master had entrusted him. From that time it seemed his mission on earth was accomplished.

Though constantly attending his master's children and promptly obedient to the slightest word of his mistress, he visibly declined. Finally he was taken sick, and despite the best medical attention and kindest nursing, he died February 4, 1863.

One of the children Mat helped raise was Chalmers' son Robert B. Glenn, a future governor of North Carolina.

Land Tracts of the Battlefield of South Mountain

Each Newsletter includes a survey, patent, or deed related to the land tracts in the vicinity of Crampton's, Fox's, and Turner's Gaps. These three gaps in South Mountain represent the main area contested by the Union and Confederate Armies in the Battle of South Mountain on September 14, 1862.

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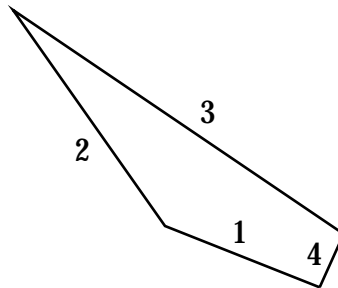

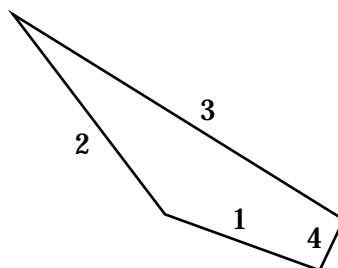

Will of Jacob Benner

(Note: Jacob Benner was the husband of Mary Magdelana Fox, a daughter of Frederick Fox of Fox's Gap in Maryland.)

In the name of the Benevolent Father of all, I, Jacob Benner of the County of Montgomery and State of Ohio, do make and publish this my last will and testament.

Item first, I give and bequest to my beloved wife Mary Benner all the house hold and kitchen furniture that she may chose to take for her own use, and one third of the net proceeds of all my real and personal estate that I may be possessd of at my death, in money after the same shall have been reduced to money by my executor as hereinafter provided.

It is my will and desire that my executor shall in a reasonable time after my decease, sell at public veue all my personal propert, and within one year after my decease also to sell all the real estate that I may be possessed of at public sale to the highest bidder on such terms as he may think best for the interest of my heirs.

And the money arrisingfrom my personal assets and from the sale of the real estate, after first paying my just debts and expenses, shall be divided as follows:

First, I give and bequest to my beloved wife Mary Benner as above stated one third of the net proceeds of my real and personal estate in money, and the remaining two thirds to be divided into eight equal shares. To my children as follows: one share to eaqch of my sons, Jacob Benner, Samuel Benner, Daniel Benner, and Trederick Benner, and one share to each of my daughters Mary intermarried with Sampson Strader, and Elizabeth intermarried with Jona Gebhart and Catherine intermarried with Wm Akin, deceased, and the remaining one share to my daughter Sarah intermarried with James Ryon, except one hundred dollars of her share, which I give and bequeath to her daughter Mariah Friberger now about twelve years of age said one hundred dollars I hereby authorize my executor to put on interest for the use of said Mariah Friberger until she arrives at the age of eighteen years and then to pay the same over together with the interest to the said Mariah Friberger.

Item 2nd, I do hereby nominate and appoint John Conley my executor of this my last will and testament hereby empowering him to settle up my estate, to collect all my just dues and to convey all my real estate as herein before named by good and sufficient deed or deeds to the pruchasers.

It is further my will and desire that my son Frederick shall have the use of the farm on which I now live from the term of one year from the time of my decease, at the same rate of rent that he now pays for the same provided he desires to remain on it.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this twelfth day of April AD 1852

Fox's Gap Section

Casualties in the 51st Georgia Regiment during the Maryland Campaign September 1862

Significant Research Findings related to the Battle of South Mountain

We again have the privilege of presenting an article by Kurt Graham. The article provides new evidence regarding the battle at Fox's Gap in Maryland on September 14, 1862. It presents documented casualty counts of Confederate forces in the 51st Georgia Regiment during the Maryland Campaign. Kurt retains all copyright privileges related to his article.

The 51st Georgia Volunteer Infantry Regiment was formed during the spring of 1862. Its men came from the rural counties of southwest Georgia. During the winter of 1861/62, the Confederacy came to the realization that the war would last much longer than originally expected and that great numbers of new soldiers would be needed to carry on the fight.

The 51st was one of many new units formed that spring to fill this need. Initially the unit was sent to South Carolina to train and to guard against Federal raids from the coast. The 51st was placed in a brigade with the 50th Georgia, 15th South Carolina, 3rd South Carolina Battalion and Phillips Georgia Legion in July 1862 and was ordered to report to Richmond, Virginia. Command of this brigade was assigned to Brigadier General Thomas F Drayton, a West Point classmate of President Jefferson Davis.

Drayton's brigade became part of Longstreet's wing of the Army of Northern Virginia and headed north to join Stonewall Jackson's wing near Gordonsville, Virginia in mid August 1862. The 51st was involved in two skirmishes on the upper Rappahannock River on August 23rd (Beverlys Ford) and August 25th (Waterloo Bridge) and sustained a number of casualties in each of these actions.

At Second Manassas on August 29th and 30th, the 51st was held in reserve and suffered no casualties. They would not be so fortunate in the upcoming Maryland Campaign. On September 14, 1862, GT Anderson's brigade and Drayton's brigade led D R Jones division as they hurried back south from Hagerstown, Maryland to reinforce D H Hill's hard pressed division holding Turner's and Fox's Gaps on South Mountain against the attacks of two full Federal Corps. Upon arriving at Turner's Gap around noon, Major General Daniel Harvey Hill hurriedly led Anderson's and Drayton's 1900 men south along the ridge of the South Mountain to Fox's Gap.

It was at Fox's Gap where the Federals routed Samuel Garland's North Carolina brigade earlier in the day and threatened to break through into Pleasant Valley beyond the gap. Hill already had forwarded G B Anderson's and Roswell Ripley's brigades from his own division to Fox's Gap and now planned to employ the 4000+ men of these four brigades to counterattack the Federals and drive them back down the east side of the mountain.

Ordering an alignment of the four brigades in the Old Sharpsburg Road, Hill envisioned a huge left wheeling attack that would flank the Federals on their left. Drayton's brigade was positioned at the Gap itself and was to form the hinge or pivot point for the attack. Things went wrong almost immediately.

G T Anderson's brigade shifted too far down the Old Sharpsburg Road opening a 300-yard gap between it's left and Drayton's right. Nonetheless, Drayton had his attack orders and with the Phillips Legion, 3rd SC Battalion and most of the 15th SC aligned left to right in the Old Sharpsburg Road, he launched these 900 troops forward into the open field and woods to the south. Meanwhile, the 50th and 51st Georgia, which had been aligned behind a stone wall facing east to guard the brigade's left flank, were now ordered to shift into the Old Sharpsburg Road and face south.

Unbeknownst to General Drayton, two fresh Federal divisions arrived just beyond the woods to the southeast at about the same time his troops reached the gap. The Federals were poised to unleash their own attack just as Drayton launched his. As the 300 man Phillips Legion penetrated the woods on the left flank of the attack they ran into two thousand attacking Federals. The two South Carolina units to the Legion's right were also hit by thousands of additional Federals pouring in from the south. The situation quickly became hopeless and the three attacking Confederate units were pushed backwards through the woods and across Wise's field.

As the Phillips Legion came out of the woods, the 51st Georgia, located in the Old Sharpsburg Road, almost mistook the Legion men for Federals and would have opened fire

had not Chaplain George Smith of the Legion ran back to tell them not to fire. The 3rd South Carolina Battalion rotated 90 degrees and dove behind a stone wall bordering the Ridge Road south of the gap and began firing at the Federals now coming out of the woods to the south and east.

Although this gallant action provided the retreating Legion with covering fire and caused the pursuing Federals to pause at the line of woods bordering the east side of the field, it eventually proved to be fatal. Other Federals began to enfilade the 3rd's position from the south and even began to penetrate the woods to the west behind the 3rd. Meanwhile the 50th and 51st Georgia in the Old Sharpsburg Road (with the 50th on the left) slugged it out with Federals on the other side of Wise's field and another small field to the east. Their resistance did not last long as the 800 man 17th Michigan regiment moved north under cover of a ravine and came in behind the exposed flank of the 50th. Now taking fire from front, flank and rear the two regiments were shot to pieces, finally breaking and fleeing into the woods to the northwest of the gap.

The 50th Georgia on the left suffered the most damage, losing 80% of its men, with a high percentage of killed and wounded. Nonetheless, the 51st still was very severely handled, losing 60% of its men. Unlike the 50th, though, half of the 51st's casualties were made up of men who were captured. Almost all were exchanged within a month and would rejoin their unit to fight again.

Sgt. Isaac Domingos of the 51st's Company G observed in a letter to his family, "at Boones Burrow (sic), or South Mountain, I was in the fight and was color bearer, carrying the flag for the regiment. In that fight we did not have more than 15,000 to 20,000 men while the enemy had all 100,000; so you can see they soon flanked and whipped us, and captured a great many. Here I was captured with my flag and carried to Fort Delaware but was released in three weeks and three days afterwards." While Sgt. Domingos is well off the mark in his estimate of the troops engaged, the 800 Georgians of Drayton's command must have felt that they had been attacked by 100,000!
